I would not mind it so much if we did not have so far to march. **The Yankees are at little town called Edinburg in this county and is 12 miles from here and are trying to rebuild a bridge where we burned we have to go down and skirmish with them so as to annoy them and retard their progress as much as possible.** They have several batteries stationed on the hill near th bridge and waste any amount of ammunition firing shell at us, they have a great many sharpshooters too who favor us with a good many shots. Their cavalry are no account at all they always stay in the rear of the infantry and in the several brushes we have had I have not seen a Yankee cavalryman yet except after the battle when about 500 or 600 of them were after us but a handful of Ashby’s men put them to flight. **Ashby is doing more service up here than anyone else he has killed a great many of the enemy and they fear him more than they do Jackson,** day before yesterday he gave them a few rounds with his artillery and completely cleared away their bridge and they did not work on it anymore... Heavy firing has been going on all day down the road. **Ashby is at it as usual I have not heard how far the Yankees have advanced today but am sure they have**

not made more than a mile or so they advance very cautiously if they do not look out we will catch them in some of the mountain passes and if we cannot whip them will frighten them to death... The infantry fight was commenced by the 27th Regiment who were deployed as skirmishes when the enemy advanced they fired a volley and fell back on our Regiment which was posted in a hollow to support McLaughlin’s Battery we then engaged them and kept up on fire for over an hour and only fell back when our ammunition became exhausted all of our boys had 35 rounds except some few of us who had an extra package in our pockets. The 5th Regiment advanced to our support or rather to cover our retreat after our regiment left the field I stayed back with the 5th as I had a few cartridges left and then I got some more from a member of the 5th who had his arm wounded and could not use his gun. Our Regiment remained on the field longer than any other Jackson done the most impudent thing that night after the battle that was ever heard He camped us on the road in sight of the battlefield and our fires extended three miles on each side of the road and our men were entirely exhausted a very few men could have captured us. I was so broken down when I left the battlefield that I could not keep up with the Regiment 5th. I imagined before I went into battle that the sight of the dead and wounded would horrify me but it had no effect on me at all several of our boys fell very close to me and one of Captain Robinson’s men fell at my side seeing our men fall only made us fight the harder.” etc. Some age toning affects parts of pages 3 & 4 o/w F-VF letter with great content. **\$750.00**
